Indiana fireworks laws

Indiana has four main laws regarding consumer use of fireworks:

- You must be 18 or older to purchase fireworks.
- An adult must be present for children to use any kind of fireworks.
- Use of fireworks is limited to your own property, the property of someone who has approved your use of fireworks or a location designated specifically for the use of fireworks.
- Fireworks are allowed from 9 a.m. to 11 p.m. year-round and from 9 a.m. to midnight on Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day and New Year's Eve unless a local ordinance specifies otherwise. Many local ordinances specify otherwise.

Pittsboro

• Fireworks are <u>allowed in Pittsboro</u> all year long from 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. Other restrictions limit fireworks from 5 p.m. to two hours after sunset June 29-July 3 and July 5-9. They are allowed from 10 a.m. to midnight on July 4 and from 10 a.m. Dec. 31 to 1 a.m. Jan. 1.

Pittsboro Town Ordinance Chapter 92: Nuisances

92.03 Noise

- (A) Fireworks. Fireworks, as permitted under Indiana law (IC 22-11-14), are Permitted year-round but may not be used between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m., except fireworks shall be permitted:
- (1) Between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and (2) hours after sunset on June 29, June 30, July 1, July 2, July 3, July 5, July 6, July 7, July 8, and July 9;
 - (2) Between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 midnight on July 4; and
 - (3) Between the hours of 10:00 a.m. on December 31 and 1:00 a.m. on $\,$
